The main emphasis is on presenting the tools by which the EU wants to achieve its goal of a unified jurisdiction with all the necessary tools, and on the other hand, the subject points to the obstacles that this activity brings on the part of the member states. During the course, students will become familiar with the most fundamental and well-known decisions of courts and European bodies in this area.
