Course requirements: Continuous evaluation: written examination (20%). Final evaluation: oral exam (80%). Classification scale: A / 1 = 91 - 100%; B / 1.5 = 81 - 90%; C / 2 = 73 - 80%; D / 2.5 = 66 - 72%; E / 3 = 61 - 65%; FX = 0 - 60%. The subject is tested using the uncommented legal regulations.	
Learning outcomes: After completing the course the student is able to: - explain the basic concepts and development trends of Roman personal, family and property law and the structure and nature of the sources of Roman law; - recognize the essential legal and factual issues contained in simpler practical cases in the field of Roman personal, family and substantive law enshrined in the sources of Roman law; - logically argue in favor of and against the various legal constructions and opinions in a certain part of the system of Roman private law, or in the system of the whole Roman legal system. - understand the timeless significance of many institutes of Roman private law for the content concept of many institutes of contemporary private law.	
Class syllabus: 1. The developmental periods of Roman law in the light of the development of state law; 2. Sources of Roman law (types and characteristics); 3. Subjects of law (natural and legal persons; legal capacity); 4. Legal status of slaves (origin and termination of slavery, legal status of a slave); 5. Legal facts (concept and types); 6. Legal capacity (concept and assumptions); 7. The Roman family in the legal sense (agnatate relationship, cognate relationship) 8. Marriage law (formation and termination of marriage; property relations between spouses; types of marriage); 9. Substantive law (system and characteristics); 10. Possession (concept, types, protection); 11. Ownership (concept, types, subjects)	

- 12. Protection of property rights.
- 13. Rights in rem to another's property (concept, characteristics and system).
- 14. Classification of rights in rem to other people's property (personal and land services, lien).
